

Work Order #7 Tasks





Activities Conducted Since April 6, 2017 Gulf Consortium Meeting

- Continued consultations with individual counties regarding project definition and refinement
 - Santa Rosa County developed a pre-project water quality monitoring analysis and approach
 - Levy County assisted with project refinement
 - Escambia County assisted with conceptual design & feasibility study needs and scope development
- Met with Restoration Council staff in New Orleans on April 26, 2017



April 26, 2017 Meeting with Restoration Council

- Discussed unique aspects of the Gulf Consortium organization and the Florida SEP development
- Presented an overview of the Preliminary Project List
- Discussed the list of questions developed through County consultations
 - Planning Grant Uses
 - SEP Content and Organization
 - SEP Approval and Amendments
 - Bonding, Advance Funding, and Debt Reimbursement
 - Uses of Spill Impact Component Funds
 - Pre- and Post-Project Monitoring



Key Points from the Council Meeting

- Impressed with the quality and diversity of projects represented in the Preliminary Project List
- Level of detail for project descriptions is discretionary; however, conceptual design (30%) is <u>not</u> required for SEP approval
- Conceptual design, feasibility analysis, Best Available Science, detailed project budgets and phasing will be required for individual project implementation grants



Key Points from the Council Meeting

- SEP review and approval will be based on compliance with:
 - The RESTORE Act
 - Treasury regulations
 - SEP guidelines developed by the Council
- The Council has a maximum 60-day review period for State Expenditure Plans
- The SEP may be amended at anytime and there are no defined limits on the number of future amendments



Other Key Points of Interest

- The 25% infrastructure limitation does not apply to wastewater upgrade projects that specifically target <u>existing</u> pollution problems
- Spill Impact Component funds may be used to improve private properties if such improvements are necessary to achieve project benefits – i.e. septic to sewer hookups on private lots
- Properties acquired using Spill Impact Component funds will require a notice of "federal interest" and applicable land use restrictions in real property records



Other Key Points of Interest

- Project costs for projects described in the SEP cannot be reimbursed if those costs were incurred prior to SEP approval
- Baseline monitoring is not required for SEP approval; however, project implementation grants will require Observational Data Plans and Data Management Plans to document project benefits
- The Gulf Consortium may sub-award funds reserved in the planning grant for conceptual design & feasibility studies directly to individual counties; however, those sub-awards would require a planning grant amendment



Recommendations Going Forward

- It is in the best interest of the Gulf Consortium to now accelerate the development and approval of the SEP
- Conceptual design and feasibility studies for individual projects should be conducted post-SEP approval – <u>not</u> concurrent with SEP development
- The SEP should include a <u>separate</u> <u>project</u> that encompasses conceptual design, feasibility studies, and grant writing for all other projects described in the SEP




Recommendations Going Forward

- The SEP should provide a vision for the entire 15year payout, and include descriptions of the projects proposed by all 23 counties, regardless of their stage of development
- The SEP should provide a detailed Work Program which describes project development needs, and outlines the anticipated sequencing of future implementation grant applications
- The Work Program should be used to secure leveraged funding commitments from DEP and others for the entire payout period




Proposed Accelerated Schedule






Proposed Accelerated Schedule
